<b>Brief description</b>	<p>The course introduces law students to the economic analysis of law. It assumes basic familiarity with the concepts microeconomics. Its main focus is private law (including property rights, contracts and torts) and criminal law. It also covers questions of legal and extra-legal enforcement as well as the legal process (trials and settlements). While it is based on models on rational choice, it also pays attention to bounded rationality as discussed by behavioural economics.</p> <p>Students become familiar with the basic analytical tools of economics and how to apply them to real-life legal institutions and cases.</p> <p>Prerequisite for incoming students: a course on the Principles of Economics or Microeconomics.</p>
